

CDB CLAWBACK DOCUMENTATION — HOW TO USE IT

Recording what the \$200 deduction did to you · Version 1.0, September 2026 (Classification: Public)

WHAT THIS FORM IS FOR

This form records, case by case, what the \$200 monthly Canada Disability Benefit deduction has cost one person. It is a documentation form: it builds the record rather than disputing a decision on your file.

Alberta is **the only province or territory clawing back the CDB** from disability income support. The deduction sits in regulation at AR 96/2026 Schedule 1, s.1(1)(e).

The deduction does not depend on what Ottawa pays you. \$200 comes off whether your CDB was approved for less than \$200, whether your DTC determination is still pending, or whether no federal money has arrived at all. The trigger is the notification step, not receipt of the money.

BEFORE YOU FILL THIS OUT

Two things to get straight before you fill this in. The CDB requires the federal Disability Tax Credit first — no DTC, no CDB. And the DTC assessment your doctor charges for is covered by the province as a **repayable advance**, which is not the same as being paid for. Ask in writing what you will owe and when.

The only exemption is the modified living allowance, which applies to people in continuing-care facilities. Anything telling you the CDB is exempt from clawback is wrong.

One thing that is not counted: the \$150 Canada Disability Benefit supplement is not treated as income under AR 96/2026 Schedule 1 s.1(1)(e). If it has been deducted from you, that is worth raising separately and in writing.

Have your paperwork beside you. Your federal determination letter showing the approved CDB amount, and your AISH or ADAP statements showing the \$200 coming off. The gap between those two numbers is the thing this form exists to record.

WHAT EACH SECTION IS ASKING FOR

In plain terms, section by section. You do not have to read it all — find the part you are stuck on.

What the form establishes first

That the deduction applies regardless of the amount received, including where the federal amount is under \$200 or has not arrived. That framing is the point — you are not reporting a processing error, you are recording a designed outcome.

Your details and your numbers

Your file number, your approved CDB amount if you have one, and what has been deducted. Where your CDB is less than \$200, the difference is your loss every month, and it compounds. Put the monthly figure and the number of months.

Where you are still waiting

If your DTC or CDB is pending and \$200 is coming off anyway, say so and give the dates you applied. That is a distinct and worse situation than being short by the gap, and it should not be recorded as the same thing.

Refunds owed

The form notes that refunds of the over-clawed difference have been slow even where the recipient submitted their federal determination letter. If you submitted yours, record the date you sent it and what came back.

The contact directory

The later pages carry Alberta Supports offices with their zone inboxes and toll-free numbers, verified against alberta.ca/contact-aish as of May 2026. Toll-free numbers are noted as the most reliable route.

albertadisabilitybreakdown@outlook.com. This form is unusual in the library: the record is its purpose, so sending it to ADSB is not an optional extra here. It is still not a substitute for raising a refund with the program.

Keep your own copy with your determination letter attached.

The two documents together are the proof. Separately they are each half an argument.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT

If you are owed a refund of over-clawed money, ask for it in writing, by name, with the months listed. A general query gets a general answer.

Keep every reply. Slow or absent refunds are themselves part of what this form is recording, and a documented non-response is evidence.

If the deduction is wrong rather than merely unfair — a supplement counted that should not be, or a deduction starting before any notification — that is a correction request or an appeal, not a documentation form. The library has separate forms for those and this one does not replace them.

WHAT NOT TO DO

Do not describe the CDB as exempt from clawback. It is not, and repeating that costs people money when they plan around it.

Do not send original documents. Copies, always.

Do not let this form stand in for a refund request. Recording what happened and asking for your money back are two different actions and you may need both.

In April 2026, the AISH program announced it will deduct \$200 per month from every recipient's payment in connection with the federal Canada Disability Benefit (CDB). The deduction applies regardless of the amount the recipient actually receives from the federal government -- including in cases where that amount is less than \$200, or where the federal benefit has not yet arrived.

This form is how each case becomes part of the record.

WHAT IS THE CANADA DISABILITY BENEFIT (CDB)?

The Canada Disability Benefit is a federal program that launched in July 2025. It pays up to \$200 per month to disabled Canadians between the ages of 18 and 64 who qualify. The benefit is income-tested -- many recipients receive less than \$200, and some receive nothing at all.

To apply for the CDB, a person must first be approved for the federal Disability Tax Credit (DTC). The DTC requires a medical assessment that most doctors charge \$150 to \$400 to complete, paid out of pocket by the applicant.

WHAT IS HAPPENING IN ALBERTA

Alberta is the only province in Canada clawing back the CDB from disability income support. As of April 2026, AISH deducts \$200 from every recipient's monthly payment -- regardless of what the recipient actually receives from Ottawa.

That deduction applies even when:

- Your CDB is approved for less than \$200 (the gap is your loss every month)
- You are still waiting on your DTC determination (no federal money has arrived)
- Your CDB application is still pending (no federal money has arrived)

AISH has been slow to refund the over-clawed difference, even when the recipient has submitted their federal determination letter showing the actual CDB amount.

WHY YOUR DOCUMENTATION MATTERS

There is no public number on how many AISH recipients are being over-clawed. Some AISH staff were not informed that the DTC is a prerequisite for the CDB, so recipients have been routed in circles while the \$200 deduction continues to come off each month.

Without documented cases, the pattern stays invisible to the Alberta Ombudsman, the Information and Privacy Commissioner, federal oversight bodies, and the press. Each form filled out is a documented receipt. The pattern is what gets the system to fix it.

The federal CDB requires the Disability Tax Credit (DTC). The DTC requires a medical assessment. Most doctors charge \$150 to \$400 to complete the form. AISH says it will pay the assessment cost. It will not. It will LOAN you the cost, and take it back from future AISH benefits in full.
