

Write to the Minister

A letter anyone can send

We can each send a letter directly to the Minister responsible for AISH and ADAP. The more of us who do, the harder we are to ignore. Tell them your situation, in your own words, and how the move to ADAP is affecting you financially, emotionally, and physically. Your story is the evidence.

What makes a letter land hardest

Stick to what is true and provable, because that is the part they cannot wave away. The plain fact is this. Tens of thousands of us were already assessed and found to have permanent disabilities that prevent us from working. Nothing about our conditions has changed. Yet we are being moved to ADAP with no new individual assessment and no individual medical decision on our files, and the independent appeal that used to catch mistakes has been removed. We were never sent clear information explaining how ADAP would affect us.

That is not just a complaint. It is a human rights concern, and it deserves to be heard as one.

Where to send it

Email your letter to the Minister of Assisted Living and Social Services (Nathan Neudorf):

Keep a copy of what you send, with the date. And keep your personal details to the letter itself, not to public posts.

Send copies, too

After you send it to the Minister, send a copy to others who should see it. The more people who cannot say they were not told, the stronger this gets.

- Your own MLA. Find your MLA and their email at assembly.ab.ca under Members. If you are not sure who yours is, look it up at elections.ab.ca.
- Your disability service provider or case worker, if you have one.

Subject: AISH to ADAP transition, a human rights concern

Dear Minister,

My name is . I am

who has been notified of a transition to the Alberta Disability Assistance Program.

I was assessed and found to have a permanent disability that prevents me from earning a living. That finding has not changed. Yet I am being moved to ADAP with no new individual assessment, no individual medical determination of my own case, and no independent appeal of that decision. I was not given clear information explaining how ADAP would affect me before this began.

Maximum 1500 characters. In your own words: what your disability is, how long you have been on AISH, and what losing your income or stability would do to you financially, emotionally, and physically. Say it plainly, in your own voice.

Reclassifying people with permanent disabilities as able to work, without assessing us individually and without the independent appeal that used to protect us, raises serious concerns about discrimination and our human rights. I am asking you to:

Maximum 350 characters. Pick what fits: explain the basis for moving me without a new assessment; reconsider my transition; restore independent appeal rights; or answer how this respects the rights of disabled Albertans.
